21/12/18 - Police focus on violent crime ahead of busiest weekend of the year

Police focus on violent crime ahead of busiest weekend of the year

Police have warned local people they will not tolerate any violent behaviour ahead of what is likely to be their busiest weekend of the year.

Extra officers will be on the streets of town centres to help keep people safe. Violent crime traditionally goes up over the festive period as people go out celebrating.

There will also be a dedicated domestic abuse unit on duty. They will be responding to reports of domestic violence and paying visits to high-risk victims and offenders.

Chief Inspector Steve Beard said: "Christmas is a happy time for most people. However, as people drink more alcohol this often leads to a rise in violent offences, both on the streets and in homes.

"Extra officers will be on the street to help people stay safe and enjoy their Christmas celebrations.

"We'll also have a dedicated domestic abuse unit on duty in the county. I'd urge anyone who is a victim of domestic violence not to suffer in silence and to call police. We are committed to tackling domestic abuse in all its forms.

"Being drunk is no excuse for being violent. We will take a zero tolerance approach and I urge people to take responsibility for their behaviour."

21/12/18 - Leamington businessman ordered to pay confiscation order under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002

Leamington businessman ordered to pay confiscation order under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002

Warwickshire Police Economic Crime Unit (ECU) has secured the confiscation of £69,650 under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 (POCA) after a man was convicted of drug offences.

Malkit Singh Sangha, 48, of Kenpas Highway, Coventry, was on 19 December, ordered to pay the confiscation order within three months at Warwick Crown Court.

If Mr Sangha is unable to pay the money within three months, he will serve a 12 month prison sentence and still be liable to pay the full amount.

This follows a financial investigation that began in May 2017, after Sangha was arrested by Warwickshire Police and subsequently charged on suspicion of drug offences. On 29 January 2018, he was given a two year suspended sentence for possession with intent to supply crack cocaine and heroin at Warwick Crown Court.

Kaye Williams, Financial Investigator for Warwickshire Police said: "This case is a clear example of Warwickshire Police officers and staff working together to not only secure a conviction but to strip the assets of individuals convicted of supplying drugs wherever we can, by applying and making use of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002.

"Criminals should be warned that Warwickshire ECU will endeavour to seize money generated by criminal activity at every opportunity.

"Removing money that is the proceeds of acquisitive crime including drug supply, goes to the heart of our commitment to protect our communities from harm."

19/12/18 - Protect your home and your property this Christmastime

Protect your home and property this Christmas

With the Christmas and New Year upon us, you are probably in the process of buying presents and stocking up on supplies for the festive season. However, at this time of year rich pickings can be found by criminals. We want you to be able to relax and enjoy the festive season, so here are some useful tips to ensure that you don't become a victim to an opportunist thief. There's a brief checklist and more details to help you have a great and crime free Christmas.

When using your vehicle:

- Never leave presents or valuables on open display in your car. Even plastic carrier bags could attract a thief.
- Park in safe, well-lit areas.
- Use secure car parks, lock your vehicle & remove valuables.
- Remove your SatNav and any associated cradle. Wipe off any marks left on your windscreen.

When out shopping:

- Do not leave your purse, wallet, keys or mobile telephone in your shopping trolley or basket.
- Do not put any valuables down at the checkout when purchasing items.
- Keep your valuables in an inside coat pocket or zip them in your bag and keep it close to your body.
- If stopping off for a mid-shop coffee, don't leave your valuables or purchases unattended whilst you purchase a drink / use the facilities.

When at home:

- Don't advertise to thieves what you have in your home.
- Don't put presents under the tree until Christmas Eve.
- Don't have your presents visible from the outside of your home. Place your Christmas tree away from windows and external doors.
- Don't store presents in sheds/outbuildings.
- Don't leave discarded present boxes outside and in view.
- Property mark and register your new gifts
There's more detail here to help you check your security and safety:
- Make sure gifts and valuables, wrapped and unwrapped, are out of view and not visible from any windows. This applies in the car as well as in the home.
- Photograph valuable property and log any serial numbers. Don't store the information on a laptop, as that might be stolen too - keep it on a memory stick in a safe place.
- Don't put gift packaging out for recycling or leave it sticking out of your bin - thieves will notice boxes for branded products like laptops, TVs or accessories that could indicate an expensive piece of kit somewhere in the house. The safest thing to do is to break down any cardboard boxes or fold them inside out so that you cannot see the branding. You can then store them out of sight inside your home until you can dispose of them at a local recycling site.
- Mark any expensive gifts you receive for Christmas with a UV pen or property marking service/product such as Smartwater. This will make it harder for burglars to sell the items and allow police to return them to you.
- Lock all doors and windows, leave a light on and draw the curtains when you go out at night.
- Keep your doors and windows locked from the inside even when you are inside your home.
- Visible burglar alarms, exterior security lighting, timer lighting switches and leaving the radio on help to deter thieves and give the impression that somebody is at home.
- Bolt and padlock garden gates and make sure you don't leave ladders out, or other things that burglars could easily use to climb on. Remember to lock your garden shed and store your tools inside; it stops burglars using your tools to break into your house.
- Consider fitting extra padlocks to gates, sheds and garages. Don't keep presents in the garage or shed.
- If you're going away, we always recommend asking a trusted neighbour to pop in to your home every now and then to turn the lights on and off, draw the curtains, collect the mail and make the house look occupied. It goes without saying, make sure everything is properly locked up before you leave and the burglar alarm - if you have one - is set.
- We advise cancelling your newspapers, magazines and milk deliveries. We also recommend that you don't advertise the fact you are away from your home on Social Networking sites - thieves use Social Media too! You don't have to be a member of a Neighbourhood or Home Watch scheme to be a good neighbour, and even if you don't have much contact with your neighbours, Christmas could be the perfect time to break the ice, have a friendly chat and get to know them a bit better.
- For those concerned about theft of motor vehicles we recommend that you consider using a visible immobilisation device such as a Disclock or Krooklok steering immobilisers or other similar products. These act as deterrents because they require to be removed to facilitate a vehicle to be stolen.

18/12/18 - Two people arrested for theft of motor vehicle following vehicle being stung twice.

On the morning of the 15th December, Warwickshire OPU had a car fail to stop on the A45 Westbound Ryton to Tollbar. It was a stolen car on cloned number plates. The car was stung twice and stopped with tactical containment. Two people in custody at the scene. Incident 188/15/12/18 refers.

18/12/18 - Two people arrested following pursuit for a number of offences including theft of motor vehicle.

A male and a female were arrested in a stolen vehicle in Bedworth by Officers last night. Officers tried to stop the vehicle in Bulkington, however the driver rammed the police vehicle and made off at speed. A pursuit ensued involving several police vehicles and the police helicopter. The pursuit came to an end after a stinger was deployed and the stolen vehicle crashed on Bedworth Lane in Bedworth. The two occupants of the vehicle were arrested by officers for a number of offences.

Warwickshire has seen a increase in vehicle thefts over recent months and we are deploying a wide range of tactics to apprehend the offenders behind these offences. We have had some significant successes and this is just the latest of several arrests linked to vehicle crime in recent weeks.

Both suspects remain in custody at this time. Anyone with information is asked to contact police on 101 quoting incident 22 of 18 December. Or you can give information anonymously by calling the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or visit their website www.crimestoppers-uk.org
